

Pupil Premium Grant Expenditure

Report for Parents: 2015/16

The Pupil Premium is allocated to children who are, or have been in the previous six years, eligible for FSM (Free School Meals, now called Ever 6); children who have been looked after continuously for more than six months and children of Service families. Historically, FSM children make slower progress and achieve lower results than those children who do not receive FSM. This is a national issue. In the main, service children achieve very well at school. However, schools have reported that there can be additional needs relating to service children's emotional and social well-being. The purpose of the Pupil Premium is to target support to 'narrow the gap' and schools are able to use the Service Premium to fund this support, as they feel appropriate.

Schools are free to spend the Pupil Premium as they see fit. However, we are required to hold detailed records of how we spend the funding. From September 2012 we are required to publish online information about how we use the Premium. This ensures that parents and others are fully aware of the extra support we provide to these students and its impact on personal development as well as academic attainment.

Nature of Support 2014-15 (September 2015-August 2016)

Targeted interventions have taken place to develop pupils' basic skills.

Homework club has continued to develop pupils' independence, basic skills and inquiry skills.

ICT equipment has been purchased to support at home learning.

Music equipment has been hired to enable pupils to have music lessons.

Curriculum focus of PPG spending 2015/16 (September 2016-August 2017)

To continue to maintain a high level of Learning Support Assistants to provide small group support both in class and out of class.

To continue to facilitate small group tuition led by teachers will continue for our oldest pupils.

To continue to support pupils to be given the opportunity to participate in extra-curricular activities and visits through subsidised costs.

To continue to develop pupils' basic skills through targeted intervention.

To offer parents support to attend in-school events through subsidised costs.

To continue to run a homework club to develop pupils' independence, basic skills and inquiry skills.

To provide opportunities for pupils to purchase or hire specialist equipment to further develop learning opportunities.

Measuring the impact of PPG spending

The school will evaluate the impact on each pupil at the end of each term. Evaluation will focus on academic gains relative to non-PPG peers. Consideration will also be given to the impact on pupils' self-confidence of intervention.
